April 16- Music Monday Activities



- Supplies Needed:
 Chain-link fence (or any fence on which you can securely hang items)
 - Musical instruments, pots and pans, spoons, kitchen tools, paint brushes etc.
 - Cable ties, string, yarn, twine or ribbon, electrical tape

Instructions:

Infant/Toddler Age Activity: Fence Band

- Tie string, yarn, twine or ribbon to musical instruments, spoons, kitchen tools, paintbrushes, etc.
- Secure all objects by wrapping electrical tape, around the item where the string is attached.
- Tie the other end of the string, yarn twine or ribbon to the fence.
- Safety note: Make sure the strings tied to the fence cannot go around a child's neck. Space out materials.

Pre-school Age

Activity: Our Families OR Finger Play & Song

Supplies Needed:

- Large piece of chart paper
- Marker
 - OR
- Flannel Board
- Photos to coincide with the My Family

Instructions:

- Bring a large piece of chart paper and a marker to Circle **OR** Flannel Board and Photos
- Ask the children what types of jobs their families need to do at home and what jobs they can help with
- Sing the song (sung to Mulberry Bush):
 - This is a job we do at home at home, do at home, do at home.
 - This is a job we do at home, my family and me!
- List the jobs the children name.
- EXTENSION: As each child names a job and you are writing it on the chart, sing the above song while the child acts out the job!

Flannel board Song:

- Sing My Family (sung to Muffin Man)
 - \circ $\;$ Tell me what you like to do, like to do, like to do.
 - \circ Tell me what you like to do with your family.
 - Add what each child tells you:
 - Cheryl likes to walk the dog, walk the dog, walk the dog.
 - Cheryl likes to walk the dog, with her family!
 - Our House
 - Here are the windows (make a square)
 - Here is the door (make a triangle)
 - Come on in, I'll show you more (wave as though inviting them to come)
 - Here is the kitchen and the living room, too (point to pretend rooms)
 - A bathroom, a bedroom and a room for you!
 - An attic and chimney and a roof above.
 - My house is a home and it's filled with love!

<u>School Age</u> Activity: Talent Show OR Karaoke Fun

Supplies Needed:

- Songs children would like to sing
- Paper for story telling or poetry
- Pencils, crayons, color pencils

Instructions:

- Activity 1
 - Have a talent show emphasizing music or host the America Idol show. Children could tell a story, a joke, read poetry about music, or re-write the lyrics to a favorite song and perform for the younger children and parents. Include traditional acts of singing, playing instruments, etc.

Examples of language that can be used between caregiver and child:

Infants/Toddlers:

- "When you bang the pan with the spoon it makes a plunk-plunk sound."
- "Jimmy made a new sound when he kicked the muffin tin with his foot!"
- "I like the sound you just made! Can you please make it again?"

Preschool:

- "What type of job does your Mom or Dad around the house?"
- "What type of job can you help your Mom or Day with around the house?"
- "Let's name some of the jobs done at your house."

School Age:

- "I see you like this song a lot! Tell me what you like about it?"
- "Great job with your poem John. You look like you are smiling when you hear it."
